Introductions

A hand out was given to members to go over the purpose of the committee. It includes the framework and standards as well. The committee had developed a draft of the Ethnic Studies Statement of Purpose last year, which provides the vision for a PreK – 12 Ethnic Studies framework. Staff visited El Rancho High School last February and got much of the information to move WJUSD forward with the Ethnic Studies program.



Welcome by Elodia Ortega-Lampkin

Elodia congratulated administrators for their hard work in implementing this program at their sites. She expressed how much community members, including Cirenio Rodriguez, have worked hard for years to add ethnic studies and help it grow in Woodland.

This program is a huge undertaking and we are further along than other districts. We need to work together to get teacher buy-in so the program can work.

Review 2017-18 Accomplishments and Ethnic Studies Summer Institute

In August, we began our Summer Institute and we had a full boardroom. There were over 50 teachers present. The presenter, Carlos Hagedorn shared some background about himself and what he is working on with the teachers in the trainings. The summer courses consisted of one full day for administrators and two days for teachers.

Some of the topics for the Summer Institute were a 101 on what ethnic studies is and what it is not. The institute had several speakers that presented those days. We want to make sure that staff and community members know that we are not trying to teach about Mexican American studies but about all types of ethnic studies. Many districts are hesitant to teach about ethnic studies. We will be doing trainings for teachers each second Wednesday of the month.

September 12, 2018 was the first training for this school year and we had a group of 44 teachers that went over the Community Cultural Wealth Model.

Provide Update on Ethnic Studies Course Enrollment

A handout was given on how many students we have had enrolled in the current ethnic studies courses at the high schools. In previous years, we have only offered the courses as a semester class but this year we are having them as a yearlong class. The numbers show that the students are interested in the courses.

Crystal Grooms added that she has spoken with the floral design and the culinary arts teachers and they have shown how they can expand their curriculum with ethnic studies.



Setting Goals for 2018-19 Ethnic Studies Work: What will our focus areas be? What does the group want to accomplish?

The group would like more clarification of what the committees input will do. Last year the committee worked on the vision and statement of purpose for the group. This is the second year they are meeting and we would like to work on what will be meaningful. A handout was shared for goal setting. In addition, another handout had meeting dates that have been updated for the school year.

Last year staff went to the state capitol to support a bill to make ethnic studies a requirement for A-G. The bill has been revised so that districts can apply for grants to develop ethnic studies programs, starting in 2019-20. Our district web page has an ethnic studies page that you can look over for information. We will update it as we have meetings with all the agendas, minutes from the meetings, and handouts. If you have anything, you would like to share or have included on the page you can send the information to Christina to look over.

- Is there a working program at other districts that we can look at as a model?
- How can we do holidays to teach about other cultures?
- There is a 1.7% of African Americans in Woodland and we need to serve them as much as we serve the larger groups.
- We need to work with elementary because it is hard to identify how the program will run with them.
